I have watched tamariki become increasingly confident in their ability to learn through the use of Te Reo and NZSL. I have also seen how easy it is for children to accept others who are different if only they are given a bit of background knowledge in how we can all be different but still have similarities. As an educator, I absolutely love knowing that I can positively affect a child's life, and to a greater extent, the world too!

What I have to offer:

- A respectful, supportive, and caring environment
- Indoor and outdoor areas that allow quiet time, cooperative play, physical and risk-play opportunities, and creative thinking.
- Activities that directly contribute to the social, emotional, physical, spiritual, and mental development for all tamariki based in play and the needs of the children involved.
- Both individual and group documentation of learning-Every child has their own journal with an individualised learning path based on their interests and development.
- We also have learning "themes" that come from the main collective interests of the group of tamariki enrolled.
- Daily and intentional use of Te Reo Māori and New Zealand Sign Language.
- A range of resources that include art materials, climbing frame, pretend kitchen, water play, books on a range of topics, carpentry tools, blocks, gardening, and play dough.
